The 23rd Virginia Scottish Games were quite successful. For the first time we had no rain, the weather was frigid - in the low 80's. The fiddler's tent experienced huge crowds, 250 people attended the Potomac Valley Scottish Fiddle Competition. This was the 20th anniversary for this competition which began here in Alexandria in 1976, just after the birth of Scottish Fiddling Revival (Scottish Fire). The judge was Dr. John Turner who also made his first appearance 20 years ago to win the first of his ten U.S. Scottish Fiddling Championships. After the competition, Dr. John Turner gave a workshop and points on how to be a better fiddler.

The winner of the **John Angus MacDougall Memorial Trophy** was **Anne Leslie**. This is the second time Anne Leslie has won this trophy which was donated by Dan MacDougall, Mid-Atlantic Regional Commissioner. We had many people visit the Clan MacDougall tent and I was happy to see them. Alan Miles MacDougall and his wife Jean were visitors along with many others. Those who attended the tent were: Dan MacDougall, Suzanne O. McDougall Maryland Rep. Don MacDougall Virginia Rep and his wife Sandy, and Peter Clepper.

The **Frederick Scottish Expo** in Hyattstown, Maryland is the second time that Clan MacDougall will have a presence. Thanks to Suzanne O. MacDougall, Maryland Representative who arranged to have a ten again this year. This will be the first Scottish Fiddling Competition at

these games and again, thanks to Suzanne O. MacDougall for being the Fiddle Chair who arranged to have John Turner as Judge, Dan MacDougall as Stewart and many trophies, cash awards and medals. I am looking forward to this competition which will be my debut as a Fiddle Steward. The duties of a Steward are many including running the competition, advising the competitors which order they will play, helping the judge tally the score, introduce competitors and announce the tunes to be played.

The Mid-Atlantic Regional activities for 1996 will end with the **Scottish Christmas Walk**. This Christmas parade is always on the first Saturday in December. This year it will occur on **7 December, 1996** and we hope that all will share in the spirit of the season. ☺

Notes from the Mid-Atlantic Region

The Virginia Scottish Games started in 1973, pioneered by Alan Miles MacDougall and other people who were dreamers & visionaries, people who had courage to create and fulfill that dream. The games, after a shaky start, progressed from a one day event to two days. The introduction of Scottish Fiddle in 1976 was a thrill for me; it was at the 1976 games when I first heard John Turner play. John is a tall, impressive man and he wears a kilt of Montgomery Blue. John was the U.S. Scottish Fiddling Champion for over ten years, he then retired to allow others to compete for the Championship. The Virginia Scottish Games are held on the fourth weekend in July, two weeks after Grandfather Mountain. This year they are being held on 27 and 28 July. We are blessed to have some of the hottest weather for Highland Games and visitors frequently voice their opinions about our fine Virginia climate. However, there is not much we can do about the weather because our games are held on the grounds of Episcopal High School when school is not in session.

Being a staff member means attending all meetings, taking notes, representing your event and keeping in mind that people are depending on you. This year, the fiddle chairperson was unable to attend meetings because of other commitments, the responsibility fell to me. Having to make decisions, sometimes doubtful, and for me, often in uncharted territory. I had the responsibility for choosing the site and all logistic requirements for the fiddlers. Their needs were: a 20x20 foot tent, chairs, complementary tickets, tables, ice, soft drinks, food, trophies, cash awards, judge's fees and travel costs, T-shirts and baseball hats for fiddle staff members...whew...it makes me weary thinking what one competition requires. Multiply that by 20 or more game events and you have a challenge to meet and solve.

With the fiddlers requirements completed, it's time to think about the needs for Clan MacDougall tent. The same sequence is repeated on a smaller scale - we rented a 15x15 foot space, a sun tent, 1 table, 4 chairs. Invitations are sent out. People are recruited for tent duty; a tent requires four people for two days, provide volunteers a break to enjoy some of the game's competitions. A check list for the tent kit is reviewed and replenished. Refreshments are made available for visitors, membership forms, copies of The Tartan, name tags etc. A cram course on MacDougall lore to refresh ones memory. Tent duty is made easier with the help of Virginia Representative Don MacDougall, Maryland Representative Suzanne O. MacDougall and Peter Clepper. We hope that all visitors have a good time, leave with fond memories and come back in the future.

Suzanne O. MacDougall, the Maryland Representative, will be at Clan MacDougall tent for the *Frederick Scottish Expo* in **October 6 & 7**. This is our second time at this small game which is growing and adding new events every year. Suzanne is a staff member of the Frederick Scottish Society who sponsors this event. There is talk about having a Scottish Fiddling Competition at this game and I am working with Suzanne in setting it up. I may be the Steward for the competition. The Steward aids the judge, adjusts the microphone, introduces the competitor, announces the fiddle tunes and helps the judge with the prizes to be awarded. Tent duty looks much easier! If you are in the neighborhood, comes to Hyattstown Fair Grounds for an enjoyable stay and listen to good music.

Soon it will be December and my thoughts move towards the *Scottish Christmas Walk* in Alexandria, Virginia. A splendid affair taking place **December 7, 1996**. This colorful Christmas parade provides a fun time for all. Pipe bands, Scottish Clan Societies, floats, and Scottish bread of dogs all lend themselves to the magic filling the air. The streets are decorated in holiday greens, Santa and his elves are busy with children, the festive spirit of the day rules. Don't take my word - come and join Clan MacDougall as we stroll down St. Asaph St in all our Scottish and Christmas finery. ☺



Dance Competitions

A Page Middle School student was one of three Middle Tennessee dancers who took home honors in the United States Highland Dancing Championships and the North American Championships held in July in Houston, Texas.

Erin Hannigan, 12 of Franklin, an eighth grader at Page Middle School, placed second overall in the U.S. championships.

However, I can claim an expertise in research, and that is all that I need to write this column well.

Write to me with your questions regarding any aspect of Scottish life, and I will research and print your question with the answer and source in an upcoming issue of the *Tartan*. I will also be more than happy to publish additional information from other sources, or even corrections when you find more reliable information which better answers the question and forward that information to me. This is a forum for the Clan, and hopefully we will all be more informed as a result.

I am leaving the categories for your questions open to any aspect of Scottish life. Some questions might include: What do Scot's wear for everyday attire, and how does it differ from their formal attire? Which side should a lady wear her tartan sash on? Is it ever appropriate to wear two tartan

plaids at the same time? How did the Haggis custom begin? What is the difference between a Clan Chief and a

Chieftain? Why do the athletes at highland games throw a telephone pole, and why is it called a "caber?" What is the order of services for a Scottish wedding? The only question I will not consider is, "What does a Scotsman wear beneath his kilt?"

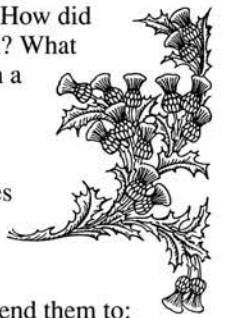
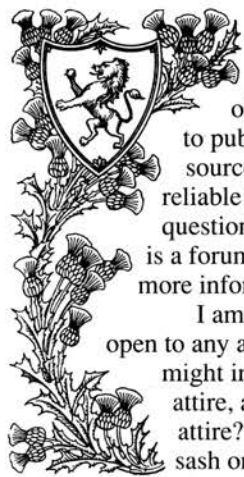

Please also note that some questions may take longer to research, and therefore may be printed some time after you have sent them. I will try to answer 2-3 questions per issue, and here is the first one:

WHAT DOES THE PHRASE "SCOT'S WHA HAE?" MEAN?

The phrase "Scot's what hae" is the title of a poem by Robert Burns (1759-1796) which means "Scots who have."* The phrase is part of the first line of the poem, which continues, "wi' Wallace bled," making the entire first line, "Scot's who have with Wallace bled." (For the purposes of this column, you must pronounce the question mark, and therefore the true name of this column is "Scot's who have questions.") The poem was first published in *The Morning Chronicle* in May, 1794. Burns, having witnessed Robert Bruce's march at the battle of Bannockburn, and hearing Robert Bruce's battle march, *Hey Tutti Taiti*, was inspired to immortalize the battle in a poem which would fit the tune. I am not sure if this is the tune we sing it to now, or not.

A MacDougall Family Gathering

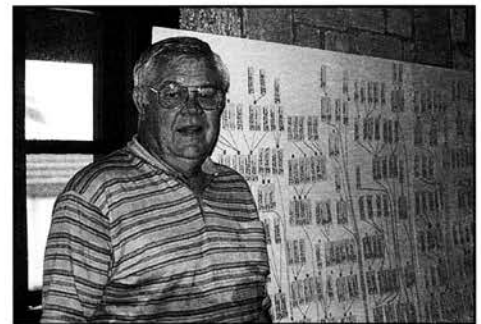
The day that James McDougall left Bowmore, Scotland on the island of Islay in 1831, he did not dream of all that lay ahead. He was 15 years old, an orphan with the courage to try to change his destiny.

He was sailing for Nova Scotia, Quebec, Canada - a trip that was to prove critical for 212+ of his off-spring that gathered in LeMars, Iowa on June 30, 1996 to renew old acquaintances and celebrate the gathering of part of the clan.

This day would have made him very proud for these were great grand children, great great grand children, and yes even great great great grand children of the man who sailed from Scotland that day in 1831. His adventure had not only carried him to Canada, but in 1838 then on to the United States where he met his bride and raised a family of 3 boys and 3 girls, and to a farming career in Wisconsin. In 1862 James and

his oldest son Alexander enlisted in the 27th Regiment of the Wisconsin Volunteers to help resolve the Civil War conflict. In 1870, the entire family homesteaded to Northwest Iowa where they farmed for the remainder of their lives.

The June 20 McDougall reunion was organized by his great grandson, John McDougall of LeMars, Iowa. Another great grandson Judson N. McDougall of St. Louis, MO was the master of ceremonies who gave an interesting account of the colorful history of Clan MacDougall, with a chart of the genealogy of James' descendants, complete with tartan, the coat of arms, and pictures of Dunollie and Gylen Castle. A pipe added color with Scottish music and everyone enjoyed the afternoon horse show also organized by great grandson John. A great time was had by all with many request for repeat gatherings in the years ahead. ☺
